THE CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

WITH CHAPLAIN TIMOTHY LARK

"Atten-hut" or "Ten-hut"!

This expression is frequently heard among those who have served in the armed forces or those who have watched military programs. Service members are instructed to immediately stand up straight, with their hands at their sides and their gaze forward, by using this attention order. It indicates that you should focus, stay vigilant, and be prepared to act. It is a phonetic abbreviation for "attention." Upon hearing the order "Atten-hut," you stop whatever you are doing right away and position yourself, regardless of whether you are watching TV, playing cards, making phone calls, napping, or even taking a shower. I think God uses different circumstances in life to wake us up; that is, to tell us to stop what we're doing, pay attention, and take in the lesson the Lord wants to impart. Even though things are going well for you now, anything might change everything at any time. I frequently tell people that sometimes in life you may feel like the world is on top of you, and other times you may feel like you're on top of the world! Anything can happen to turn our lives upside down quickly.

The Lord reminded me of this on my way to work one morning after taking a glance at my phone. Have you ever heard of the term rumble strips? Most people probably have not, but if you have traveled in a vehicle, you've either heard of or experienced them. For road safety purposes, these are often referred to as alert strips or sleeper lines. They reduce/prevent head-on and off-road crashes. They are there to warn sleepy or inattentive drivers they are about to leave the road or cross the centerline.

I glanced at my phone for a second, but then heard the rumble strips as my tires approached the edge of the road. That made me realize right away that I was getting into danger and made me focus on the road rather than my phone. I will refer to those as safety strips since they warned me before I ran off the road, and for that I was grateful.

God revealed to me that anything might happen in a moment. We never know what will happen to us in a split second; it may be something positive or negative. A single answered prayer, phone call, memory, diagnosis, drunk driver, sentence, pay raise, hug, kiss, or other event or encounter might forever change your life! Our lives are subject to sudden transformation. I recalled a few Bible stories, such as John 11:43 about a man named Lazarus who was dead and was resting in a tomb. However, everything transformed from death to life at the moment Jesus called him out! After discovering Jesus, a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhaging for 12 years was miraculously healed. In Luke 8:43, the Lord fed over five thousand people by taking a young boy's lunch and turning it into a grocery store. John 6:9 Please never forget that we should pay attention to what God is attempting to teach and demonstrate to us, regardless of what is going on in our lives. Give Him your full attention and trust that, if you love Him, He will use everything for your benefit and know that He loves and cares for you. Romans 8:28.

THE MEANING OF MEMORIAL DAY

What is the meaning of Memorial Day? It's appalling how few people realize the depth of its meaning for the freedoms we enjoy today.

A large group of high school seniors were touring the Capitol in Washington D.C. on Memorial Day. The guide posed the question, "What is the meaning of Memorial Day?"

They thought about it, and together they said, "It's the day that the pool opens."

That's sad. Studies have shown that only about 25% of Americans know the meaning of Memorial Day.

Memorial Day is about remembering. It has 'memory' in it. It's easy to forget the price that was paid for our freedoms.

We can casually sit back and enjoy backyard barbecues, boat rides, and beach bashes, but the meaning of Memorial Day is that almost 1.5 million men and women have died so that you and I might enjoy our freedoms. We look to Thanksgiving as a day when we pause to give thanks for the things that we have. Memorial Day is a day when we pause to give thanks to the people who fought and died for the things we have.

Peter wrote to the church, saying, "This is now the second letter I am writing to you in which I'm stirring up your sincere mind by way of reminder that you should remember..." (II Peter 3:1,2) We need to have our minds stirred. We need to remember.

It started during the Civil War when women began decorating the graves of soldiers who had died in that war. On May 30, 1868, the day was designated as 'Decoration Day' – a day for placing flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers throughout the United States.

'Decoration Day' gradually became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored. It quickly became a day to remember all people who had died in defense of our country. In 1971, the United States Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday of May.

We must remember that freedom isn't free. People died so that we could live. We have the opportunity to make decisions today because of the sacrifices of people yesterday!
